I've written for the last several years that we have one of the best lakes in Ontario from a quality perspective. Part of that is our natural geology; the fact that we don't have significant inflows or outflows; and, that we don't have farmland or significant commercial activity on the lake. Through King Baker, our Lake Steward, we also maintain good scientific records of the chemical changes in the lake.

Increased lake usage, larger and more frequently used homes, cottages and bigger boats, all can lead to water and land quality deterioration if we don't offset these factors with good practices. Simple things such as ongoing septic cleanout and inspection, shoreline vegetation, and responsible boating

Boater Exam Training 2011 - 2012

SUNDAY July 3rd, 2011 our first all one day course was held at the Glen Alda Community Centre. My daughter in law, Allison Ho, helped out with all the many duties involved. North Kawartha Fire Dept. provided training on the use and handling of fire extinguishers along with the actual experience of putting out a **REAL FIRE**.

This year we had NEW exams produced by Transport Canada which will be changed November 1st and then again May 1, 2012. There will now be a new test every 6 months. The manuals are still included in the course fee that is still \$75.00 + HST, (unless they increase the price next year which is beyond my control). There is an initial cost of \$20.00 for the manual, available at Tucker's Marine or myself. This amount will be credited towards your course fee when you register and pay for the course. **STILL REGISTER IN ADVANCE THROUGH THE WEBSITE: www.clpoa.ca**

With the new exams considerably more difficult, it is important that students review the manual PRIOR to the day of the course. A 3 hour power point presentation is included prior to writing the exam.

This year, all 13 students completed the course and while some had to write the test a couple of times ALL graduated and received their **PLEASURE CRAFT OPERATORS CARD**.

The student with the **HIGHEST MARKS** received the Harold Forbes Memorial Award for Excellence. For 2011 this honor goes to Heather Mazzona, congratulations Heather.

For 2012, the date is **SUNDAY JULY 1ST, 2012** again at Glen Alda Community Centre.

Shoreline Shrubs

For 2012, we are hoping to have the shoreline shrub bundles available for the Victoria Day weekend. Those who place an order will be emailed indicating when the shrubs are available with directions for pick-up. The shrubs are bare rooted, so they have to be picked up and planted quickly. The bundles usually contain five varieties: High bush Cranberry, Black Elderberry, Red Osier Dogwood, Alternate Dogwood and Nannyberry. There are 25 native shrubs in each bundle: they all do well in damp conditions close to the lake. A major advantage of naturalizing your shoreline is that, when mature, the shrubs will stop geese from coming onto your property to feed on lush green lawns. A shrub barrier of five to ten feet wide *that can be pruned to a suitable height* along the lakeshore is recommended for effective geese control.

The shrubs are purchased from the Bancroft Stewardship Council's tree and shrub planting program. In the past, unfortunately, some property owners placed an order and did not pick the shrubs up; therefore, we are asking that orders be placed by Christmas and that payment accompany the order. A cheque, payable to Chandos Lake Property Owner's Association, can be mailed to King Baker, Box 551, Apsley, ON K0L 1A0. The cost is 28 dollars per bundle, tax included.

2012 SHRUB PLANTING PROGRAM



The Bancroft Area Stewardship Council and Bancroft Area Forest Industry Association facilitate the planting of over 15,000 shoreline plants each year. The plants are made available each spring to rural landowners and community organizations on a first-come, first served basis. The cost is subsidized through donations and contributions from the forest industry partners. The planting of native shrubs along the shoreline is critical to the rehabilitation of the Chandos Lake shoreline. Chandos cottagers are encouraged to take full advantage of this generously funded planting program.

As the shrubs are bare rooted and will not survive if not planted shortly after delivery, it is essential that the shrubs be picked up as soon as they are delivered.

King will email those who have placed their shrub order when the shrubs are delivered.

Oxygen in deep water

Lake trout live in the water below the thermocline during the summer. The thermocline is the point at which the temperature drops dramatically within a few meters. Lake Trout are the indicator

fish of good water quality that Chandos wants to keep. The thermocline depth is established as the summer sun warms the surface water that floats on top of the colder water. The colder water picks up oxygen in the spring lake turnover and is prevented from getting any more because it is now trapped below the warm surface water. The graphs on page 7 identify the amount of oxygen that remains at the lower depth at the end of the summer when oxygen levels are at their lowest.

We must keep checking these figures every year, as oxygen levels are affected by nutrients that grow algae. These algae have a life span and die and fall to the bottom. Here they rot and use up deep water oxygen. Lake trout need 7 parts per million of oxygen to live happily and

a minimum of 4 parts per million to exist.

Hot summers, as well as higher nutrient levels, can cause an increase in algae growth and a decrease in oxygen levels. This year, the South Bay graph indicates a return to the 2004 temperature and oxygen levels, which is most likely the result of a cool wet spring. We will continue to monitor the levels and hope for continued enhanced lake trout habitat, which is a good environmental indicator for our lake. It is not that everyone is interested in the fact that we have lake trout in Chandos Lake, but everyone is interested in clean, clear water rather than cloudy algae-filled water. As long as Chandos has a strong lake trout population, we will know that the lake is healthy.

2011 Lakeland Conference Report



The Lakeland Conference is an opportunity for shoreline property owners to come together to learn about the common environmental issues facing their lakes with local experts and organizations specializing in relevant services and information. In past years, we've explored the effects of climate change on lakes, the ecological functions of natural shorelines, and permitting work around water.

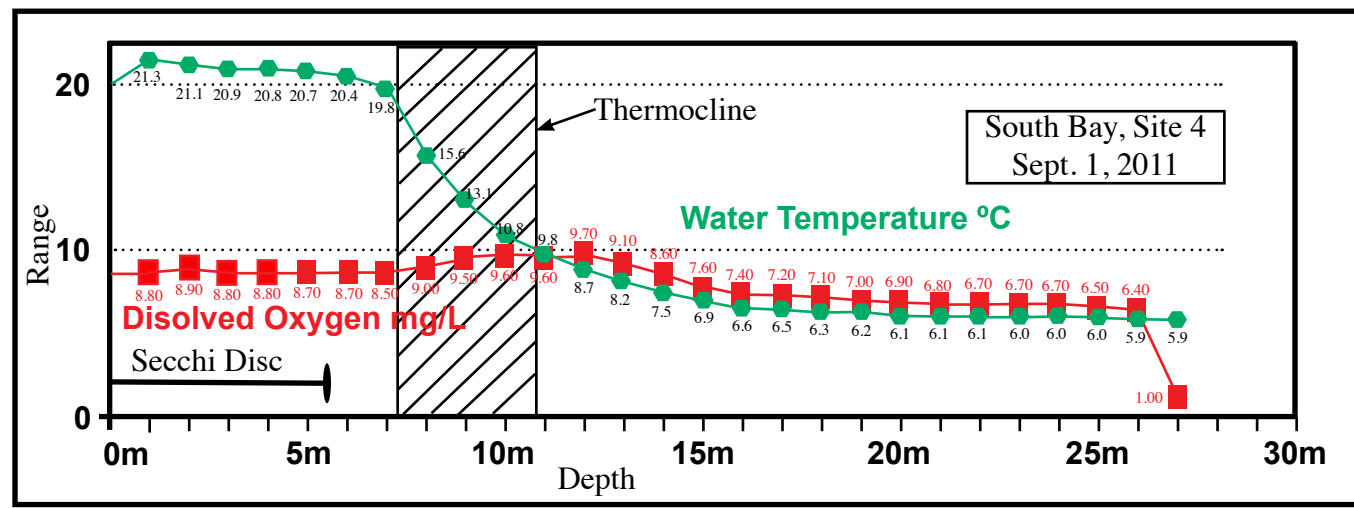
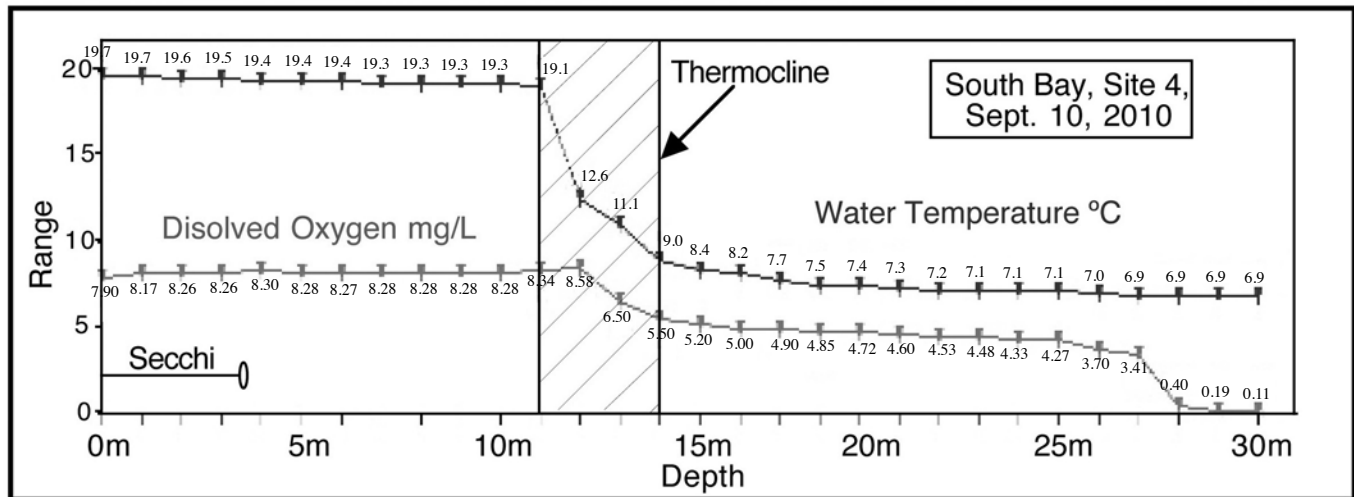
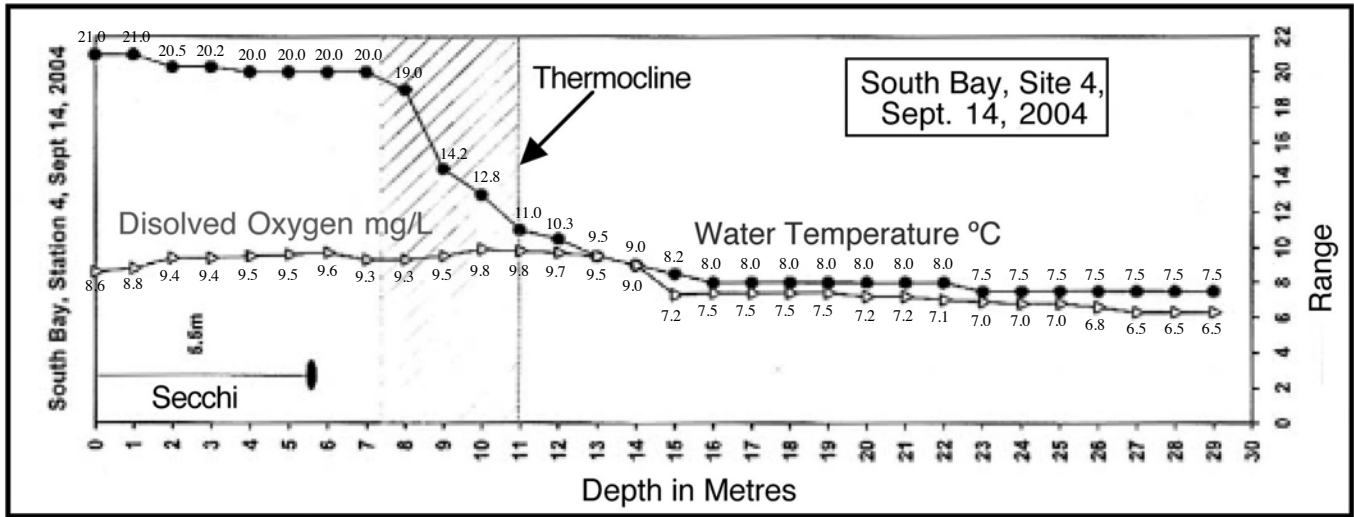
This year the Conference took a closer look at the special 'at capacity' designation that is assigned to cold water lakes with lake trout populations.

We had 50 keen and interested shoreline property owners join us for an interactive and informative morning. In the photo King Baker, partnered with Jim O'Shea, is discussing scientific data regarding the cold water characteristics of Chandos Lake lake trout. King indicated that the Chandos trout population is thriving, but a challenge to catch. Jim presented information about the development implications of an at capacity designation.

Septic Reinspections.

We need your feedback.

Our lake is generally protected from external sources of pollutants. The biggest threat to our water quality is from malfunctioning septic systems. Septics are sources of phosphates that promote weed growth, impacting shorelines and swimming areas, ultimately eroding property values. There is a chance, although very remote, that septics can also be a source of bacteria such as ecoli.

The Ontario Government is currently going through a process known as Source Water Protection. The purpose of this process is to identify potential sources of danger to drinking water. Malfunctioning septics have been identified as a potential danger, dependent upon their proximity to wells and lake or river intake areas. Unfortunately, this initiative only covers dangers to water sources used by municipal water systems, not personal wells or lake sources.

Septic systems are currently governed by the Building Code. Inspection is only required for new construction or when building permits are issued for renovations. The Township does have the current right to inspect any system if they have been alerted to a potential hazardous situation.

The CLPOA is considering advocating and supporting the North Kawartha Township to develop by-laws that would require septic reinspection every 5 years. Our intention is to partner with the other lake associations within North Kawartha (NORKLA) to present and support a common set of parameters to the North Kawartha Council.

There are a range of inspection “levels” that any initiative like this can attain. Each level will incur increasing costs and, potentially diminishing returns. We believe, in the first phase (5 years), efforts should go into identifying obviously malfunctioning systems. The process would be flexible in allowing a window

for inspection, but every septic tank must be inspected within the first 5 years. All systems within North Kawartha Township would be subject to inspection.

A number of townships have implemented inspection programs over the past few years. They vary, but commonly involve inspecting both the bed and an empty tank. Failing septic beds are identified most commonly by saturated land or excessive vegetation growth as compared to adjacent land. Visual inspection of the empty tank identifies obvious cracks or corroded tanks, particularly in very old systems (+25yrs) which employed steel tanks. An additional benefit of an inspection of this type would be the identification of potential future problems for which easy remedial steps could be taken before major repairs are required.

All new processes like this have cost implications which we will have to bear, directly or indirectly. We believe a very efficient process would involve the licensing of independent inspectors. We are hopeful that septic pumping companies operating in the area would become certified so that an inspection could occur at the time of pump out. This would be analogous to an auto mechanic being licensed to inspect cars. The Township, of course, would have overall oversight and remediation control.

We believe the whole process, excluding pump out, would be in the range of \$150- \$250 every 5 years. Obviously there are a thousand details to this. The right process is to begin a dialogue with our members. Please let us know your thoughts.

BOOM SAILING CAMP 2012

We are delighted that Boom sailing camp was a success for the second summer, and we are applying for two weeks of Boom Sailing Camp for 2012.

The BOOM Mobile program, run by the Ontario Sailing Association, is intended to give participants a fun introduction to the sport of sailing, and give them an opportunity to develop their sailing skills. Participants are taught the basics of sailing using the Canadian Yachting Association's (CYA) White Sail Level 1, 2 and 3 standards. By using double-handed sailing dinghies the CYA can introduce beginners to sailing, while still challenging the more advanced sailor.

The BOOM program will be taught from Chandos Beach and everything needed to run a sailing school, instruction boats, coach boat, lifejackets and teaching aids are provided. The boats used are two person laser Picos.

The daytime camp for 8 to 14 year olds runs from Monday to Friday, 9:00 til 16:00. While the evening classes for 14+ youth and adults runs Monday to Thursday 18:00 til 21:00.

The Ontario Sailing Association will confirm camp dates in late November and we will send out registration forms by email when the dates are confirmed.

Chandos Lake Enviro Watch (CLEW)

What does it mean to have a healthy Chandos lake? It means maintaining our population of lake trout, an indicator species in a cold water lake such as ours; it means having healthy shorelines that are not at risk of erosion; it means sustaining good water quality that is not at risk to invasive species or nutrients from leaking septics. Quite literally, a healthy Chandos Lake is a healthy life.

Such goals are at the heart of our association's latest volunteer group called Chandos Lake Enviro Watch – or CLEW, as we are becoming known. Over the past summer, CLEW has attracted a motivated and diverse group of volunteers that have undertaken several initiatives. We have engaged road associations around the lake; raised awareness on various issues through pamphlets; entertained large crowds at our information booths at the Regatta and Corn Roast; begun collecting photographs for a photographic library; engaged more people in conducting lake tests; and most visibly, we engaged cottagers in our 'Areas of Concern' map. The CLEW Areas of Concern map gives an idea of where cottagers have identified challenges, and where we can focus our efforts.

The key observation is that cottagers are aware of the challenges facing our lake – and collectively as a lake association, that we care. We aim to continue to build on our efforts and are always open to more volunteers. No

County Report

Reeve Jim Whelan and I represent North Kawartha on County Council, along with the seven other townships in Peterborough County. Major responsibilities are County Roads (Balmer Rd, CR620, and CR504 in our area), ambulance service for the City & County, social services costs administered by the City, recycling/landfill, and economic development (including broadband network implementation). Your taxes are split between County (37%), Township (37%), and Education (26%). An additional 1% to support Peterborough Regional Hospital expansion will be phased out in 2012.

Significant improvements to our County Roads have been made over the last two years – Balmer Rd, part of 504, Jack Lake Rd, Northey's Bay Rd, and we plan to restore the west end of 620 next year. County Staff have developed innovative restoration techniques to get more work done with the same funding, making these improvements possible. However, we still face a daunting list of work on roads and bridges across the county, which has been funded at only ½ the rate needed.

Peterborough County has a primary role in building an Eastern Ontario Regional Broadband network, using Federal, Provincial, and Industry funding of more than \$250 Million. Our geography makes this a challenge, but when it is completed in 2012, we will have access to world scale speeds and capacity, using telephone, wireless and satellite technologies. Broadly available internet access is a key part of our economic development strategy.
